BEING PART OF THE CLUB

WHAT DO WE MEAN BY "CLUB"?

Ballarat Kart Club is a "volunteer-run sports club".

This means the running of events, maintenance of the venue, and all other behind the scenes admin is sustained by the unpaid efforts of individuals who dedicate their time and skills for the common good.

It is the combined labours of love, pride in the venue, and the common interest in karting that makes us a "club".

The club is extremely proud to have achieved a massive track upgrade in 2023/2024 with over 2000 volunteer hours, and many in-kind donations of materials and services.

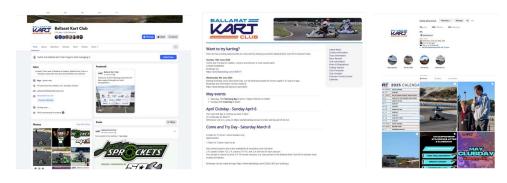
The club Facebook page is the most active source of club news.

CLUB HISTORY

Ballarat Kart Club is over 65 years old, and one of a handful of clubs in Victoria still in its original location over all that time.

In 1959 the first kart meeting was held in the Ballarat area on a gravel track at Scotchman's Lead. Back then the race was mainly contested by homemade karts powered by Villiers 7F and Pope lawn mower engines. Later race meetings were then held on a football oval at Mt Clear before the present Haddon Circuit was established in 1961.

The original gravel circuit was around 2/3 of a mile in length. After many years and changes, today the Haddon circuit is bitumen and 801 metres in length, with the majority of the track 8 metres wide.

CLUB HOURS AND NEIGHBOURHOOD

The club has neighbours in close proximity, which is unusual for a kart club, so there are limits on kart operating hours and days.

- The track is open from 9:00am to 6:00pm; ie All engines off by 6:00pm
- The track is closed to kart engines on TUESDAYS.
 This day is commonly used by schools for Human Powered Vehicle practice.
- Please always RESPECT the neighbourhood;
 ie: Don't hoon down Racecourse Rd leaving the track and don't leave litter to blow around.

CLUB BEHAVIOUR

Ballarat Kart Club prides itself on being a friendly country club, where competitors help each other without closed doors between rivals.

We particularly make an effort to make new members welcome, and assist them when they are new to karting.

The club subscribes to the Karting Australia Karting Integrity framework.

Any anti-social or abusive behaviour can and should be reported to club officials, or the Member Protection Information Officer.

CLUB HOUSEKEEPING

SECURITY CAMERAS

Ballarat Kart Club has security cameras operating around the facility 24/7.

This is for security, as well as monitoring any non-compliance or bad behaviour.

BABY CHANGE FACILITIES

Baby change facilities are located within the First Aid room near the out grid.

This room can be opened with your member key for access during social practice weekends and during non-karting events.

NO DUMPING OF TYRES OR FUEL

You must take your used tyres away with you, they cannot be disposed of on club ground or the club skip bin.

SMOKING AND VAPING

The club requests that smokers smoke outside the front gates, and nowhere near canteen or spectating areas.

It is common for the majority of competitors at an event to be juniors; for which the Victorian Government requires smoking completely outside the premises.

There is no approved smoking area on within the premises either.

Karting Australia Smoking and Vaping Rule

Smoking, (including the use of E-cigarettes), and Vaping is not permitted in the paddock, unless in an area approved by the Organiser and then, only in accordance with applicable laws.

Victorian Under Age Sporting Events Law

Smoking and the use of e-cigarettes (vaping) is banned within 10 metres of any outdoor sports venue during an under-age sporting event.

VENUE HIRE

Via arrangement with the committee, the venue can be made available to other groups (eg Retro Karts, School bikes, Human Powered Vehicles, etc) via a hire agreement providing the necessary insurances are approved with our governing body.

Please note that Ballarat Kart Club has a blanket no motorbikes policy, so the venue cannot be hired by motards or monkey bikes.

AT THE TRACK

FIRST TIME AT THE TRACK

We recommend touching base with the new member liaison or members you may already know first. Often the track will be unattended with the gates locked when you get there. Sometimes there will be people practicing, and the gate will be open.

GATE ACCESS

A member key/swipe card* is required to

- · Open the track gate
- Open the toilets
- Close the track gate

The main gate at the west end of the track will be used most of the time to enter the facility. Please ensure the toilets and main gate are locked at the end of the day when you leave.

* JUNE 2025 NOTE: Gate keys are currently out of stock for new members

PARKING

- During practice days you are welcome to park with your car still connected to the trailer.
- During a race meeting it is advised to disconnect you trailer and remove the car from the pit area.
- Do not park your car or trailer in front of the ambulance gate, in/out grid gates, sheds and building. The infield pit area around the out grid can be used but please be mindful of space.
- Do not park in the red areas, keep these free for ambulance and moving karts



USING THE TRACK

Before you can use the track, there are four primary requirements:

- A current Karting Australia License
- A current Ballarat Kart Club membership*
- A Karting Activity Controller (KAC) MUST be in attendance.
- A Karting Australia homologated chassis and engine is required. **
- * Visiting members from other Karting Australia clubs are usually welcome to use the track with prior arrangement.
- ** Ballarat's circuit license DOES NOT permit Open Performance or KZ2 karts.

Older model karts (eg Homologated in the 2000s) are permitted, as long they have current spec safety updates like rear crash bars.

Refer to Appendix B: If you don't see your kart listed in that section, it is highly unlikely to be permitted on track.

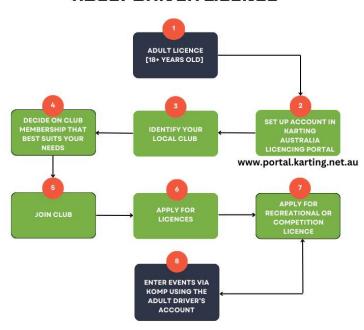

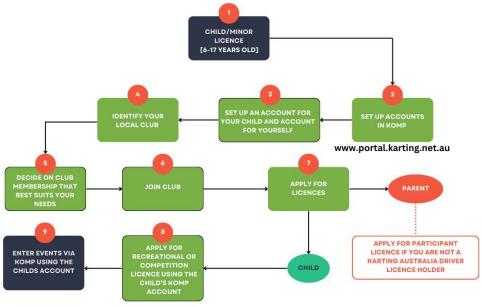

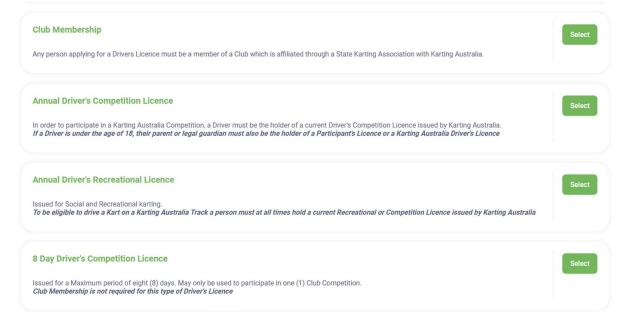

REGISTERING AND JOINING A PRACTICE SESSION – KAC AND KOMP ESSENTIAL FOR ALL MEMBERS

Every practice session MUST have a qualified KAC present (Grade 5 official).

Any club organised race session will already have Grade 4 and Grade 3 officials present for you.

KAC - Karting Activity Controller

The KAC is a recent addition that requires every entrant to register in KAC controlled activity for practice sessions.

This can be very confusing at first, but it is simply NOT optional.

The officials course and responsibility can seem daunting, but it's not overly difficult, and when you see it working in practice with others it will make more sense.

As a club we go out of our way to assist new members in understanding and meeting these requirements. So if you are stuck, just ask!

Karting Activity Controller (KAC) means the Level 5, KA Licenced Official who is in attendance at a Circuit where a Karting Activity is taking place and who is in control of the Karting Activity in accordance with National Competition Rules (NCR), Appendix 1, and the Karting Activity Supplementary Regulations that have been approved and issued (along with an Organising Permit) by the relevant SKA.

KAC Core Courses means the following courses in the Karting Australia Officials Academy:

- "Social Karting Controller Responsibilities and Requirements"
- "Social Karting Club Responsibilities and Requirements"
- "Respect Karting"
- "Safety 1st and Karting Risk Management"

REQUIRED LICENSE TYPES AND KAC QUALIFICATIONS

New Parent/Guardian

- 1. The competitor requires a competition or practice license.
- 2. The guardian requires a "Participants License" to enter a child under 18 in any practice or race event.

This means you enter the child with your own KOMP login, and not the child's.

From the KOMP portal

- Select "Applications"
- Create new application
- Select "Participant License"
- 3. Most guardians will need to obtain a Karting Activity Controller qualification.

This involves a short course, has a small fee, and requires a valid Working with Children Check. We do recommend grabbing screenshots of the test questions, as there are some trick questions that trip a few people up.

If you are not successful the first time, the test and be reset on request, and the club can assist you if you have ongoing issues.

Unlike the participants license; there can be a longer turnaround time.

If you already know someone who is a Karting Activity Controller, the child may register in their session without having the qualification yourself to get on track sooner.

However in the long term, you will not be able to go to the track with just your child and no one else until you have the KAC qualification.

4. Ballarat Kart Club membership

Only Ballarat Kart Club members can register sessions at our track.

It is simpler if the guardian has chosen a "family" membership so both the guardian and the child are listed in our system.

If you cannot see Ballarat listed, there are workarounds available by contacting the club secretary.

New Adult Member

- 1. The competitor requires a competition or practice (E-Grade) license.
- 2. A pit crew or family member requires a KAC
- Ballarat Kart Club membership
 Only Ballarat Kart Club members can register sessions at our track.

The person on track CANNOT be the Karting Activity controller.*

Typically this means you need a second person in your family or pit crew to gain the Karting Activity Controller qualification.

If you have multiple friends who kart together with a KAC qualification, you can rotate that role so both can drive at different times.

After a while you will meet other members and be able to coordinate sessions together.

* Note for solo drivers: It is NEVER permitted take to the track without another person present; its essential other people are there to assist in the event something goes wrong on track.

KAC Application Process

Prior to applying to become a Karting Activity Controller, it is a compulsory requirement to have a current and valid Working With Children's Check*, a copy of this will be required during the application process.

- Log into <u>portal.karting.net.au</u> and create a profile.
- Click on the Applications tab.
- Scroll to find Official's Licence.
- Follow the steps to applying for a Karting Activity Controller (Level 5).
- After completing the Application, you will receive a confirmation email to your registered email address, and subsequently an email in the coming days with a login to the Online Officials Academy where you will be able to complete the compulsory online courses.
- Once the compulsory courses have been completed and your Working With Children's Check has been confirmed by the State Administrator, your licence application will be subject to approval by the State Administrator.

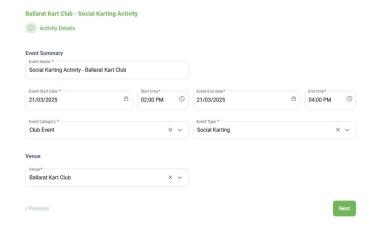

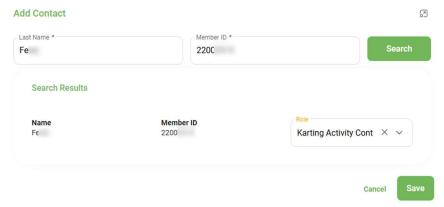
REGISTERING A SESSION AS A KAC

Using the last name and KAC number, any Ballarat member can register a session

- Select Applications
- Select Create New Application
- Select "Social Karting Activities"
- Select state and "Ballarat Kart Club" and proceed through the prompts*
- Enter the Date, Start time and Finish time
 Remember the track hours are between 9am to 6pm, and CLOSED on Tuesdays.



- Select "Add Contact"
- Enter the last name and member id of the KAC
- After a match is found, select the role as "Karting Activity Controller"
 - o No other officials are required



- Complete the application
- This application is now automatically approved and can be done on the day When first introduced, this required manual approval and 24-48 hours notice.

TAKING TO THE TRACK - KAC REQUIREMENTS

The KAC must complete the track safety check, which includes a track walk at the start of each session. It is extremely important to walk the track and scan for objects or debris before each session.

There are sections of the track not visible from the out grid, and we have witnessed weather damage and vandalism in the past.

Scanning the QR code on the posters on the out grid allow the KAC to submit the checklist before activity begins.

As a club we would prefer KACs allow others to join and share the load, but If you do not feel comfortable letting other people join your KAC session, you may close the primary gate behind you.

There is a blue Karting Activity Controller hi-vis vest located in the out grid shed, as well as necessary flags and an extinguisher.

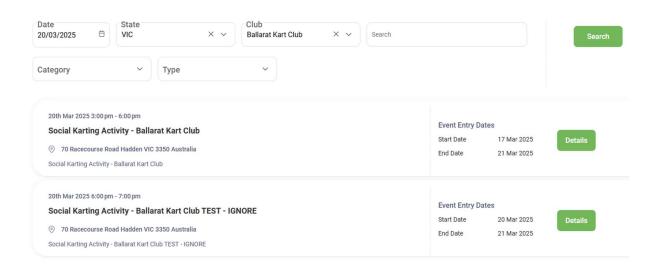
TAKING TO THE TRACK - COMPETITOR REQUIREMENTS

EVERY COMPETITOR AT A KARTING AUSTRALIA TRACK MUST REGISTER IN THE SESSION BEFORE TAKING TO THE TRACK.

After a KAC has registered a session, it is available in KOMP (Via the app or website) for any license holder to join.

For guardians, this is done using the ${\bf participant\ license\ login},$ and not the competitor.

Select the "Social Karting" Calendar, then filter by state and club



NOTE: Please DO NOT expect the gates to be open because you see an available session listed in KOMP.

The club has no control over sessions where a member has entered the date incorrectly, did not turn up, or had to leave early.

Some KA clubs choose to close track access to all members, and only open when there is a club organised event with a KAC or club official present

Ballarat still chooses to allow our members to have track keys and organise their own sessions.

However failure to follow the KAC process has huge consequences for the club and may result in all member keys being revoked.

DRIVING A KART ON THE TRACK

After you have successfully registered in the session, it's time to get on track!

Racing direction is anticlockwise, indicated by out-grid signs, and large direction arrows on the tyre barriers.

Please follow all rules in the Karting Australia manual when using the track.

During practice seniors can never be on the same time as juniors or cadets nor any combination.

Seniors can be noted by the yellow background and black numbers, Juniors are white background and black numbers and cadets are white background with red backgrounds.

The rules for running practice sessions are on the fence of the out grid, these are a summary of the rules in Appendix 1 of the Karting Australia manual. We remind all karters of the following rules in particular:

DO	DONT
DO use the out-grid and in-grid as intended - never drive back into the out grid.	DO NOT drive in dangerous or silly driving is manner. (Including 360 spins and drifting)
DO Put your hand up clearly to signal when you are slowing and entering pit in-grid.	DO NOT drive in the clockwise direction - only the approved track direction is permitted (Even if you have the track to yourself)
DO Have a working mobile phone at all times in the paddock.	NEVER mix Senior, Junior or Cadet classes on track at the same time

APPENDIX 1 – KARTING ACTIVITY (Organised Social Karting Sessions)

Adherence to these Regulations is a mandatory requirement and means that amongst other things, Drivers and people participating in this Karting Activity receive the benefit of KA's insurance cover while participating as it is an Organised, Permitted and controlled activity.

Preamble

Organised Karting Activity Sessions have been developed to allow karters of all ages to participate in a Karting Activity in a fun environment that is safe, organised, appropriately controlled, and insured. From a group of mates wanting to do laps through to a family wanting to share a few hours together... the Drivers choose how long they want to run on any given day without the added time pressure of committing to an entire Meeting.

These regulations have been developed to provide simple but effective management of the Karting Activity by the Organising Club while ensuring that appropriate safety measures are enforced by qualified and licenced a KAC or Race Official, thereby meeting the core KA value of Safety being paramount in all Karting activities.

PIT CREW AND CIRCUIT INFIELD REQUIREMENTS

For Cadet and Junior drivers, this section is relevant to their parent or guardian. Its important to follow these requirements at all times, even if you are the only people at the venue.

The club does have security cameras, and can follow-up on non-compliance or silly behaviour.

PHOTOGRAPHY/DRONES

Only accredited (And insured) photographers can take photographs from within the infield, out grid or in grid.

Members and visitors are welcome to take photos from behind the spectator fence.

No photos are permitted within the toilets as clearly signed.

The use of drones and other unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) at Karting Australia events is prohibited unless specifically permitted in writing by the governing body.

AFTER THE PRACTICE SESSIONS - RACING CLUB DAYS

After you have practiced a few times and gained experience, you may soon be ready to race. Your first race will almost always be a club day, as larger events require more experience.

Firstly, you need an official to witness one of your practice sessions, so that your "Observed Driving Session" requirement can be recorded in KOMP.

Without this requirement, you will not be able to enter the club day.

As long as you are going around the track without being a danger to yourself or others, this is a straightforward tick.

New Cadet drivers are required to have 8 karting activity sessions of at least 1 hour practice before an Observed Driving Session.

It important for these drivers that they register their attendance all their practice sessions correctly in KOMP.

If they don't, the system will not have any record of the 8 sessions practice, and they will not be able to enter the first club day.

HOW TO KNOW THE RULES

Our sport has many rules, and every event has "Supplementary regulations" that detail the timetable, specific rules, responsible officials and race format for that event.

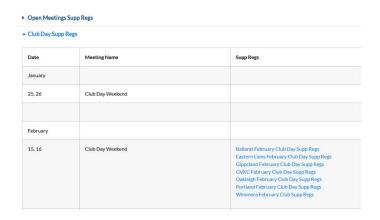

ENTERING THE EVENT

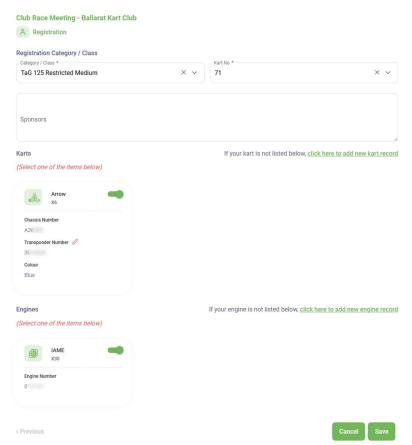
You must enter the event at least 24 hours before the event start date via the KOMP app or website. For Sunday club days, this means midnight Friday night, late entries CANNOT be accepted.

Your membership and license must still be valid on the date of the event. If they expire before that time, you will not be able to enter until you renew.

To enter, find the event in the KOMP event calendar



- Proceed to "Enter event"
- Select your race class and number
 If your number is already in use, you will need to select another one.
 Number stickers can easily be changed or covered over.
- Add your chassis, transponder** and engine details. (These will be saved after your first event)



Transponders

During a race event the lap times and position of each Kart is recorded by a magnetic strip in the start/finish line.

You must have a MYLAPS compatible timing transponder fitted to your kart during the event for the officials to be able to track your time. These times are also uploaded to the Mylaps website and app, "Speedhive". D uring an event these times can be viewed live.

Every member who races will need to purchase their own transponder in time.

For new members, the club has several transponders that can be hired on the day.

In that case, simply enter a fake number to proceed eg 000000, and it will be corrected on the morning of the race.

Entry cancellation

If you need to cancel, please contact entries@ballaratkartclub.com before the event.

KA Refund Policy

No refund is available after the close of entries, except in the case of "Duly established force majeure"

An Entry binds the Licence Holder to take part in the Meeting, except in case of duly established force majeure, and binds the Organiser to fulfil all the conditions which apon the entry was made, the only reservation being that the Competitor must use their best endeavours to participate in the Meeting.

Guidance Note:

"Duly established force majeure" includes but is not limited to compliance by the Licence Holder with General Rules, Chapter 15, Rule 3 b) and other medical emergencies for which a medical certificate is provided."

ON A CLUB DAY

Club Day events are aimed at mainly club members and is a very social fun racing day.

Typically practice starts at around 9am and racing begins around 11am.

We do have our canteen open during club day events as well as open meetings.

The race format and length can vary, but may include qualifying, 3 heats and a final.

A driver's briefing will be held before the first qualifying or race heat.

New drivers will be shown track essentials such as the starting tram lines, formation line, and pit entry.

Then it's time to calm the nerves, get on the track and start your racing journey.

Endorsements

P platers are recommended to concentrate on finishing their first races, and not on outright speed or passing.

An endorsement is usually granted when a P plater completes more than 75% of the race laps on the day. 4 endorsements are required to go from D grade (P plates) to C grade.

For Cadets and Juniors, at least 2 club day endorsements are required before you can enter a state series.

AFTER CLUB DAYS: VICTORIAN COUNTRY SERIES

Six clubs in South-Western Victoria join together to host the annual Victorian Country Series.

The clubs of Ballarat, Hamilton, Portland, South West (Cobden) Warrnambool and Wimmera (Horsham), are geographically close together, attracting 200+ entrants with a mix of competitors from each of the six participating clubs, from most major clubs in Victoria, and far flung interstate competitors typically from South Australia and Tasmania.

Depending on your level, you may be racing with fellow amateurs, fellow enthusiasts, or the best in the country.

Past series champions include Scott McLaughlin, Anton de Pasquale and Corey McCulloch to name a few recognisable talents.

The VCS events are no further than 2-3 hours travel for most Ballarat members.

Many Ballarat members pit together, and camp or eat-out together during the weekend, making it a social and family event. As a result, the local pubs are packed with VCS competitors on the Saturday night. While there are many events around Victoria you can compete in; Ballarat highly recommends the VCS as your first step up after a local club day. The series also has enormous annual benefits for your club.



KART CLASSES

There are many classes in go karting which are largely based on age restrictions and weight classes.

All weights below are a total **MINIMUM** weight of kart and driver.

Cadet 9 (7-9 years)

This the youngest class offered and designed to teach kids with a restricted engine.

This competition runs a Vortex 60cc Mini Rok or KT100J** fitted with a restrictor or a Comer SW80**.

Drivers can practice between the ages of 6 and 7 and can race once 7.

Minimum weight - 100kg

Approx power – 6hp

** The KT100J and Comer SW80 are legacy engines, and you may find them going for a bargain.

However we would strongly recommend avoiding them and getting the current standard Vortex Mini Rok in either Cadet 9 or Cadet 12.

The legacy engines are significantly slower, and can only be raced at a club day.

In our experience, those who get a legacy engine "for practice and learning", get disheartened with being last and leave the sport before long.

Cadet 12 (10-12 years)

Based on the Cadet class this class uses the Vortex 60CC mini R or Yamaha KT100J fitted with a restrictor plate.**

Minimum weight – 110kg

Approx power – 8hp

** As above for the KT100J

KA3 Junior (12-16 years)

This is the first class offering the use of the KA100 fitted with a restrictor plate. This engine can be carried through to senior with the restrictor plate removed. There are two weight divisions offered here

Light – 132kg

Heavy – 150kg

Approx power – 13hp

KA3 Senior (15 +years)

This uses the same KA100 engine as KA4 without the restrictor. This is a low cost engine with a very competitive class. Offered usually in two weight classes

Light - 150kg

Medium – 170kg

Approx power – 22hp

TAG Restricted (Also called Victorian Combined)

Entry level racing for water cooled 125cc engines.

The most common engines are the IAME X30 and Rotax EVO.

This class runs a restrictor in the exhaust. Once enough experienced has been gained with 6 off endorsements, you can apply for a license upgrade to move to TAG.

The TAG restricted classes are very popular at club days and open meetings.

At a club day, the IAME KA100 is also able to join the class in the Masters (40+) class

Light - 160kg

Medium - 180kg

Heavy - 200kg

Masters (40+) - 172kg

Approx power - 22hp

Typically a Tag Restricted Kart Weighs between 85kg-90kg – if you weigh around 95kgs with your racesuit and helmet on your weight would be 180-185kg with kart putting you in the Medium Class.

TAG 125

This is the fastest of common classes at a typical club day or race meets.

There are several specialised faster classes above this.

This class utilises the same engines and weights as TAG restricted but no restrictor in the exhaust.

Light - 160kg

Heavy - 180kg

Approx power - 30hp

4SS (4 stroke)

This is a growing class that uses the Torini Clubmax 210 engine. It is aimed to be a more affordable form of racing as its engines require basically now daily maintenance and cannot be tunned like other 2 stroke engines. The engines come sealed from the factory with only basic carburettor adjustments being allowed. Maintenance is also simplified with basic oil changes and basic servicing. The tyres are also designed to last longer saving on costs of replacement. This class can be ran from Cadets through to Seniors. At the moment it is only Seniors that tend to run around Ballarat due to numbers.

Senior Light – 140kg Senior Medium – 155kg Senior Heavy– 170kg

APPENDIX A: ENGINES

Engines that are used in competition should be well maintained by an engine builder, generally the person selling has a genuine reason for moving categories etc, and a reasonably true time / race log on the use of an engine. The biggest risk with buying used engine is that top end (piston and ring) servicing has been done, however the bearings in the crank are over-due. This can present a large rebuild cost if failure occurs, so always request receipts.

Engines have very tight rules (Homologation) that need to be followed by an engine builder. The current engines have very tight tolerances from factory, so there is very little variances here. A good engine builder will be able to assist with tuning the engine for various tracks to help you get the most out of the combination.

VORTEX 60CC MINI ROK

This is an air cooled engine used in the Cadet 9 and 12 class. Typically fuel/oil ratio is 18:1 using good quality full synthetic castor oil.

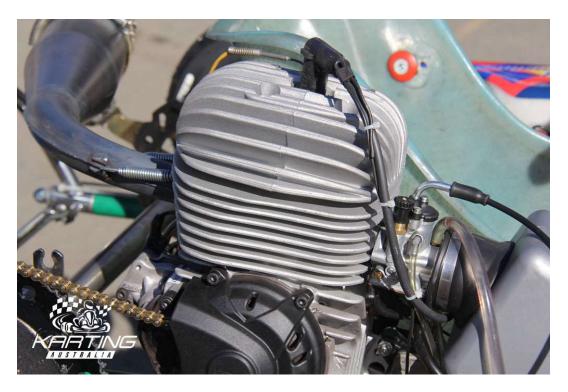


Figure 1, Vortex 60 cc Mini Rok

TORINI CLUBMAX

Basic carburettor adjustments can be make to suit the conditions, along with gearing changes. These engines can be fitted to the majority of 2-stroke type chassis (some easier than others). Some allowance should be made to make these changes.

APPENDIX B: BUYING A USED KART

There are many options to buy good second-hand equipment. Ideally a complete outfit from someone getting out of the sport is a good buy as you get everything required to go racing. As listed below, there is a lot of equipment and spares that you need to go racing, so its always a good idea to wait and get the right thing.

CHASSIS

Kart chassis are an item that simply wear out over time, the constant twisting back and forth ultimately fatigues the chassis over time, this is not to say that a used kart is bad, it's just something to keep in mind. Chassis should be checked for signs of repairs, Cracks around seat mounts and engines, or general bad scrapes to the underside. Chassis can also be twisted, although this is impossible to see with seat, engine and plastics on. Besides a simple visual check, an easy check is to place the kart on a flat surface, does the steering wheel point straight ahead? The second check is to have someone hold the steering wheel straight, and gently lift one rear wheel at a time, the amount of effort and indeed distance should be similar.

Key Points:

Age

- Bends and cracks
- · Amount of use it has had
- Some parts are easier to adjust on some models.

ОТК

There are two common types of chassis used by most people in the senior categories. There is not really any wrong choice here. There are many things to look for when selecting a chassis. Below are a few key points but please speak with a club member for best advice when selecting.

There are many manufactures that have the same chassis for these karts. These karts have more expensive components to other brands

- Tony kart (original tony kart)
- Exprit
- Kosmic
- FA (Fernando Alonso)
- Red speed (Older model)

There is a 30 mm and 32 mm side tube chassis of each make. 30 mm chassis will suit most drivers and the 32 mm would suit heavier drivers.

Arrow

This is a very popular brand these days

The X7 model is the latest frame. X6.2 previous. X5 etc. Very good and affordable chassis.

APPENDIX C: KART SETUP

TYRES

Below is a guide of the approximate pressure to start your tyres at cold and what to aim for when they are hot and up to temperature on the track. There are many factors that effect what pressure is required such as track temperature, driver weight, surface conditions etc.

KART SETUP GUIDES

When you first start karting one of the first things you will want to do after getting your kart is to go and practice at the track. The best thing you can do when you get started is talk to a club member and get them to meet you at the track to help you get the kart setup.

One mistake that is commonly made by new karters is to play around with setup early in their budding racing career. A good course of action is to spend some time familiarizing yourself with the kart on the track and learning to drive before playing with caster, camber track widths and the like.

Lower your expectations – everyone... absolutely everyone before driving a kart is sure they will be fast. The truth, the cold hard face slapping truth is you will be slow, you may feel fast but you will be slow. That is normal in fact its better than normal because a big part of the fun of go karting is learning to drive seeing the improvement and progress.

You will find that after a number of sessions that your lap times will begin to improve and once you are finding consistent lap times this is when you can start to make changes to setup.

A really great resource for explanations around different setups and how they can affect kart performance is the power republic youtube page. The best part about this resource is that its free and there is plenty to watch
